Thai food dining at the highest level

First-timers to Thai food say the same thing. "I had no idea the food is so flavorful." First-timers to Supatra's Thai Bistro say, "Wow."

For those seeking exotic flavors without a lot of exotic lands between them and their dining experience, Supatra's in Yorba Linda is a quick trip down the 91 freeway and worth the drive.

Walking up to Supatra's only the artistically designed sign hints of something beyond the norm. When entering Supatra's be prepared for a visual feast. The décor is every bit as delicious as the food that is served here. Rich colors, interesting artwork, elegant lighting, and soft exotic music give you the impression that this restaurant has been designed for the complete dining experience.

Owners Sandy and Murali Kamath tell us that a fair amount of people coming in for lunch or dinner are first-timers not only to Supatra's but to the entire experience of Thai dining. The Kamaths are very good about explaining the menu and making recommendations when new customers need a little guidance.

Here's what you should know about Thai dining: First, Thai people use spoons and forks,

not chopsticks, so you won't feel like you need to learn how to eat all over again if you are not proficient in chopsticking. Second, Thai food is served family style, this means everything is shared. Entrées come out on large plates with a spoon and everyone takes a big helping and passes it on. Every entrée also comes with white or brown rice. It's a fun way to eat. Thai food is not typically spicy but it can be ordered spicy if you prefer it

entrées like pad Thai noodles, Thai chicken basil, and crab and shrimp fried rice for about the first three visits and then they begin venturing into the dishes that are a little more exotic. "It's exciting to see the change," says Sandy. "It's like a light goes on and suddenly they turn from someone interested in Thai food to an absolute Thai food enthusiast. Of course we love it when they tell us that this is their new favorite place to eat," says Sandy.

This restaurant has been designed for the complete dining experience

that way. In Thailand, it's all about combining flavors to make truly delicious food. Thais use lemongrass, basil and other aromatic herbs, to make the food smell and taste as good as it looks. Also, because Thailand is between China and India you'll notice a good deal of influence from both in Thai cooking. If you are a curry lover, Supatra's serves eight different curry dishes and they are excellent. Most dishes can also be served vegan by request.

Murali tells us that newcomers to Thai food will typically order the easily identified

To get to Supatra's take the 91 freeway to the Yorba Linda /Weir Canyon exit. Go north three stoplights to New River Road and turn right. It's a lot quicker than going to Thailand, you don't need a passport and you'll probably like the food even better.
